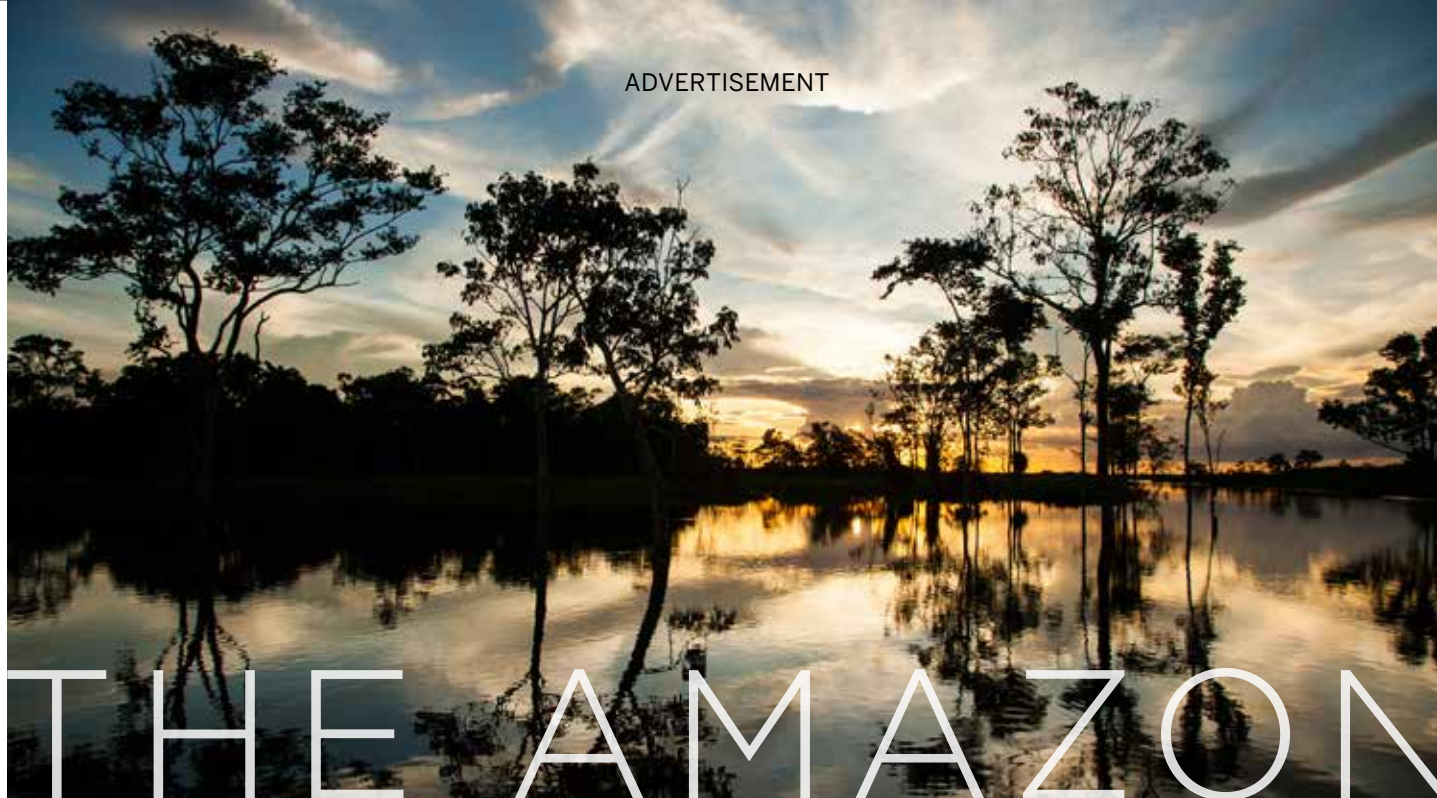


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Take an Adventure in Style

Stroll the colorful streets of this tropical metropolis, savor rainforest cuisine at chic cafés, and explore the lively market in the floating city of Belén, known as the Venice of Peru.

CRUISE IN ELEGANCE

From Iquitos, board your luxurious cruise ship, outfitted with all the amenities of a five-star boutique hotel. Sophisticated and intimate—some as small as four cabins—these ultra-modern ships are designed to give select guests an authentic voyage of discovery, with personalized service and awe-inspiring experiences at every turn. As you're carried along the world's largest river, relax in expansive suites and gaze at panoramic jungle views; indulge in world-class cuisine that marries fresh, local ingredients with cutting-edge techniques, conceived by star Peruvian chefs; and sip a pisco sour on a hammock from the sun deck, serenaded by a thousand jungle sounds.

MEETING MOTHER NATURE

Your Amazon River cruise promises a host of up-close-and-personal encounters. Paddle a kayak through giant Amazonian water lilies—some as big as eight feet in diameter. Observe

endangered pink dolphins, found only in the Amazon, as they leap elegantly just above the water. Stop at small villages along the riverbanks, and learn how fisherman, hunters, and farmers make their livelihoods in the middle of the immense Amazon forest. Spend a thrilling afternoon watching piranhas feast on fallen fruit in the swollen flood plain. Spy slow-moving iguanas, tree-swinging primates, and three-toed sloths hiding high in the tree canopy, regaled by the emphatic call of multihued tropical birds. After dark, board a raft on a quest for alligators, while naturalist guides spot caimans and capybara under the star-filled sky.



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
